# LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

# Join Us on the Road to Readiness: Building a Strong Foundation for Our Children's Future

Thank you for your ongoing support of EPEL, which continues to serve as a vital hub for our community's early childhood collaboration. EPEL is at the forefront of efforts to raise awareness about the importance of early learning, while providing essential access to resources, services, and care. Last year, I asked you to 'Be A 2,000 Day Champion' for young children, and for FY 23-24, I'm calling on you to continue that commitment by joining us on the Road to Readiness. This year has been filled with important work alongside families and the community to continue to transform our early childhood system into one that is equitable, efficient, and responsive to the needs of all children.

- FY 23-24 Impact: EPEL successfully supported 18,849 children and families through community and family engagement, outreach, and referrals, raising awareness and building stronger connections.
- Community and Family Engagement Expansion: EPEL expanded free playgroups to 29 "Connect and Play" sessions and offered 40 "Learning On the Go" opportunities, bringing family engagement directly into neighborhoods to meet families where they are.
- Parent and Caregiver Support: Through the implementation of Parent Cafés, a parent education initiative, EPEL and its partners held 10 Cafés in the Spring, serving 109 participants, with plans to further grow this valuable partnership.

- **Preschool Access Growth:** EPEL analyzed early childhood slot data and worked with 4 community partners to apply for Preschool for All slots, resulting in **222** additional free preschool seats. This expansion significantly increased access to early learning opportunities for local children.
- Strategic Planning for the Future: The EPEL board completed strategic planning for the next five years, outlining a clearer vision for early childhood success. In partnership with the EduDream team, EPEL developed a culturally responsive and equitable data strategy to measure our collective actions and outcomes, ensuring accountability and inclusivity in all we do.

I invite the community to be part of a powerful movement. Together, we can lay the groundwork for lifelong success by engaging our children in meaningful, everyday moments that promote early learning. Let's build a strong foundation, ensuring every child is ready to thrive from the very beginning. Join us on this journey and help shape a brighter future for all children!

# **2023-2024 HIGHLIGHTS**

Engaging and enriching children and families in early learning opportunities helps build foundational skills that are essential to a child's readiness journey.

## **FAMILY ENGAGEMENT**

## **Engaging Families in Everyday Settings**

EPEL coordinates three "Language in the Laundromat" sites, where families connect with community resources and children engage in early literacy activities. Bilingual family ambassadors made 87 visits to reach 365 children.

### **Community Family Engagement Events**

This summer, EPEL provided more than 40 opportunities for families to connect, play, and learn, reaching 1,833 people. "Learning On the Go" expanded its footprint to Streamwood, in addition to Elgin and Hanover Park locations. Free backpacks and nearly 3,000 new books were distributed. EPEL worked with 22 community partners to provide wrap-around services, including mobile library services, healthcare resources, early childhood enrollment, and access to mobile food pantries that served 741 families and distributed 6,126 diapers.

### Connecting Families through Play

EPEL hosted **29** free "Connect and Play" bilingual community playgroups for **413** families. These groups provide opportunities to connect with other caregivers and access resources including mobile library services, free play, storytime, and activities that help build foundational readiness skills.

#### Celebrating Young Children

"Week of the Young Child" was celebrated with **15** fun-filled events attended by **2,013** children and families. Activities celebrated our youngest learners, highlighting the importance of early childhood development and the vital role of early childhood educators.

#### **Promoting Readiness & Literacy**

Since 2012, EPEL has distributed more than **120,000** of our signature "Getting Ready for Kindgergarten" Family Engagement calendars in English and Spanish, including **11,000** this year alone. **4,548** new Bilingual (English/Spanish) books were distributed. Bringing the total to **47,771** helping provide literature to homes since 2018.

### **Supporting Families through Parent Education**

Parent Cafés provide a safe space for parents and caregivers of young children to come together to share stories, discuss challenges, express concerns, and celebrate wins in navigating the journey toward readiness. EPEL launched its first organized parent education initiative in March 2024, offering 10 Parent Cafés in both English and Spanish to reach 109 parents. EPEL is excited to expand this valuable educational support system.

# **2023-2024 HIGHLIGHTS**

## **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT & OUTREACH**

## Convening the Early Childhood Community

Twice a year, EPEL hosts Collaboration Meetings to bring community partners and families together to analyze, discuss, and collaborate. 173 partners and parents participated to create solutions that strengthen the early childhood system and narrow the readiness gap.

### Partner Coordination, Outreach, and Referrals

EPEL's approach of meeting families where they are continued to prove effective in 2023-2024. EPEL coordinates community partners to attend food pantries and other engagement events, supporting families with young children by addressing basic needs. Partners offer referrals and resources for essential services. EPEL connected with 3,560 parents of children under five at 29 pantries, making 84 referrals to help families access needed services more easily. Additionally, EPEL received nearly 200 referrals, which were followed up by Family Ambassadors to improve access and ease transitions. Throughout the year, EPEL engaged 4,123 families at 53 community events.

# Early Childhood Community Hub

EPEL's early childhood community website, www.elginpartnership.org, available in 12 languages, provides resources to support and connect families with early education and related services. Over the past year, 7,600 families visited EPEL's website, and 4,492 stayed connected through our social media platforms.

# COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS & VOLUNTEERISM

### **Community Investment**

This year, community volunteers, organizations, and board members contributed **1,885** volunteer hours and in-kind services, representing a community investment of **\$84,825** to support young children and families.

### Data Strategy Support from EduDream

EPEL was selected by EduDream to receive data strategy support for its early childhood community collaboration. A comprehensive data strategy was co-created to clarify and define EPEL's organizational outcomes, enabling more effective measurement of collaborative community goals. This initiative aimed to advance the early childhood system, ensuring better service for all families and communities. EduDream contributed 242 in-kind hours to this effort.

### Northwestern University Partnership

EPEL was selected to collaborate with a group of students from Northwestern University's Department of Nonprofit and Social Impact. Students analyzed and developed a social media plan to help us reach and impact even more families.

#### **Executive Director Honored**

EPEL Executive Director Amber Peters was recognized by the Elgin YWCA as recipient of the 2024 Harriet Gifford Leadership in Education. This prestigious award celebrated Amber's deep commitment to the community, early learning, and driving systemic change.


